The Persian Gulf Tribute at The High Ground Veterans Memorial Park in Neillsville, was built to honor all branches of America's military who served around the world, beginning with Desert Storm, and through multiple Middle East conflicts, all while marching forward in the global war on terrorism. The tribute is in the shape of a large bootprint.

There are many reasons for this shape and symbolism. The impression of the bootprint symbolically recalls the impression these men and women have had in

our world. The bootprint is a metaphor for marching forward in the war on terrorism and a metaphor for walking with you, and not past you. It is divided into two, symbolizing the sorrow felt by the loss of each of these loved ones. The two-piece memorial allows for it to straddle existing trails on the grounds and acts as a gateway for a section of the trail system for future memorials.

The bootprint allows for perennial flower beds to be located in the deepest impressions left by the boot. Symbolically, these deepest impressions allow for the

seeds of hope, the seeds of new life & the seeds of healing. It recalls the variety of impressions left in the sand of the desert-like conditions of the Middle East conflicts. The bootprint allows the Memorial to be located at a lower elevation so that those arriving to The High Ground, can view the Persian Gulf Tribute from above.

Necedah National Wildlife Refuge Hiking Trails

The National Wildlife Refuge in Necedah has several different hiking trails that meander through various areas of the refuge for you to enjoy. The **Visitor Center Trail** is a 1.0 mile trail, divided into 2 loops: **Muskrat Loop**, .25 mile trail on a boardwalk that stands above the marsh overlooking animal inhabitants; & **Karner Loop**, .75 mile trail, running through the prairie where you can see the Karner blue butterflies. Both of these trails wind across gravel, asphalt & boardwalk surfaces through prairie, wetland & forested areas. The **Observation Tower Trail** is .8 miles long & it goes through mostly forested habitats to the 2-story tower that looks out over Rynearson Pool #1, which gives a wonderful landscape view of the wetlands. Half-way along the trail is an open-air observation blind that is set on a peninsula. The **Boghaunter Trail** consists of 3 separate loops, showcasing a variety of wildlife & habitats. The **Meadow Beauty Loop** is .8 miles long & offers a mostly level hiking trail on mowed grass. The **Boardwalk Loop**, which is 1.75 miles long, runs through a native sedge meadow & prairie. The trail is mowed and also crosses over several boardwalks. The **Tamarack Loop** stretches over 3.6 miles of mowed trails. This trail has some hills and offers hikers more of a challenge, winding through a wide variety of habitats, including marshes & forests.

Hike and Bike Wisconsin State Rail Trails



In 2015, the Wisconsin State Park System celebrated its 50th Anniversary of Rail Trails in Wisconsin with the first rail trail being the Elroy-Sparta State Trail, established in 1965.

During the 19th and early 20th centuries, thousands of miles of railroad tracks were constructed throughout Wisconsin to serve passenger and freight needs. However, by the middle of the 20th century, new freight routes and transition of passenger travel to automobiles prompted the gradual disuse and abandonment of some railroad lines.

In 1964, the Chicago and North Western Railway discontinued its freight service through the Elroy-Sparta corridor and decided to abandon the grade. The Department of Natural Resources (then the Wisconsin Conservation Department) negotiated the purchase of the abandoned 32 mile right-of-way and later concluded the acquisition for \$12,000, or about \$375 per mile. The DNR designated the trail on the abandoned right-of-way in 1965 and opened it in 1967 to hikers and bicyclists. Snowmobile use on the trail began in 1968.

Since the establishment of the Elroy-Sparta State Trail in 1965, Wisconsin has developed an additional 40 state trails extending over 2,000 miles. There are now more than 1,900 rail trails spanning 22,000 miles across the country, and it all started here in Wisconsin. Happy Trails to you!

General Etiquette for All Trail Users

~Treat all trail users with respect & courtesy regardless of their sport, speed, or skill level.
 ~Stay to the right and pass on the left. Always look before changing positions on the trail. Anticipate other trail users around corners or in blind spots.
 ~Protect our environment. Stay on the trail. Do not use switchbacks or use shortcuts.
 ~Downhill traffic yields to uphill traffic and faster users yield to slower users.
 ~Share the trail, watch & listen for others. Anything you fit in your ear that impairs your hearing may not be safe.
 ~Learn & use appropriate hand sig-

nals. Motorized users often cannot hear voice signals.
 ~Respect trail closures; use only trails posted open. Obey trail signs.
 ~Carry out all litter, including your pet's waste.
 ~All users yield to horseback riders. When in doubt about who should yield, or if it doesn't appear that other users will yield, consider that they may be unfamiliar with trail etiquette. When in doubt, yield to others.
 ~When encountering a horse, speak in a calm, pleasant tone so the horse hears a human voice. Do not hide.
 ~The rider knows the horse the best. Expect the rider to advise you of the horse's temperament.

~Do not approach, scare, harass or feed wildlife or livestock.
 ~Respect private property & the privacy of people living along the trail.
 ~Pets must be kept on leashes less than 8 feet and under control.
 ~Leave flowers and plants for others to enjoy. Do not pull bark off of, cut or otherwise damage live trees.
 ~Practice low-impact trail use. Wet & muddy trails are more vulnerable to damage.
 ~Travel at safe and controlled speeds.
 ~Think of yourself as an ambassador for your activity.

DNR *Go Wild*

Come in & check out our new DNR Go Wild system! Customers are now able to follow along on their own computer screen as transactions are being completed. This system allows for the sale of all DNR hunting & fishing licenses, permit applications, trail passes & the renewal of recreational vehicles. Conservation Cards can be purchased for \$3.50. The cards contain the customer's name & DNR ID#, & can be used year after year for proof of DNR ID#. Customers need to show their Driver's License at all times when using the new system.

Gardening for Monarchs: Creating a habitat for monarch butterflies

Good monarch habitat must meet the needs of all 4 monarch life stages & multiple parts of the monarch migratory cycle. Female monarchs lay eggs on milkweed host plants. Their caterpillars only eat milkweed leaves. Adult monarchs consume nectar from a variety of different flowering plants. They need both milkweed & nectar plants during the breeding part of their annual migratory cycle. As they migrate, they need nectar plants to fuel their long flight. Monarch habitats have been declining over time. Conservation efforts to help ensure the future of these butterflies can start in your own backyard! First, choose a sunny site for your habitat & test the soil to determine if it is suitable for growing plants or amend it if needed. Next, plant milkweed & nectar plants. Adding flat rocks to your garden can help create basking zones for them to regulate their temperature. Include windbreaks, such as a fence, shrub or wall to protect your site. If your space is limited, consider planting in containers!
